

MINUTES

The meeting of the Hilltown Township Supervisors was held Feb. 26, 1972; this was a regular meeting scheduled for Feb. 19, 1972.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. Frankenfield, with all Supervisors present. Others present were Mr. Mininger, Mr. Walch, Chief Boose, Mr. Moyer, Mr. Johnson, Mr. Kinsey, Mr. Gubelman, Mr. Browning, and reporters, Mr. Cressman, for the Call-Chronicle, Mr. Mitchell, for the North Penn Reporter, and Mr. Delaney, for the Daily Intelligencer.

The meeting was opened with the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting held Feb. 4, 1972. A motion by Mr. Hartshorne to accept the minutes as read, with a correction noted, that the Supervisors can exempt 3 lot subdivisions without curbs or road improvements, and to note \$5 per front foot assessment for water lines along Route 309, if such agreement is made with the North Penn Water Authority; the motion seconded by Mr. Frankenfield. A motion to pay all bills was presented by Mr. Hartshorne and seconded by Mr. Frankenfield.

Our regular meeting scheduled for March 18, 1972, is postponed until March 25, 1972, at 9:00 A.M.

We received a copy of a letter from our attorney to Victor Lynn, Environmental, Solid Waste Coordinator, expressing our concern over a newspaper report of the settling at the dump and if there should be further examination by the Supervisors for the safety of the residents.

We are to meet with the Pennridge School District, Central Junior High School office at 7:30 P.M., to discuss the vacating of the Blooming Glenn school building, on Monday, March 6, 1972.

The Supervisors signed a resolution, No. 72-4, resolved that the Supervisors of Hilltown Township erect a Stop sign at Hayhouse Road at the intersection of Rickert Road; so resolved this February 26, 1972.

We signed subdivision plans for Ronald Ewing, 3 lots, Highland Park Road; Moyer tract #3, 5 lots on Broad St.; and Walter P. Lomax, 1 lot, Hilltown Pike.

We were notified by Jerry Taylor, Dept. of Transportation, that the Chevron Oil Co. will be making seismographic studies on Callowhill Road to Broad St. and on Fairhill Rd.

Mr. Louis Walch suggested that we have an ordinance to have junk cars removed. We have ordinances, but it is rather hard to determine what one person considers junk and another does not.

The Supervisors were served a summons in civil action, U. S. District Court for the eastern district of Penna., Civil action File 72-362, Charles J. Mager and Hazel D. Mager, his wife, Plaintiff versus Hilltown Township; Steinberg & Girsh attorneys, seeking damages in excess of \$1,000.000.00.
