

Basement Wall Firestop Detail



This detail is provided by Hilltown Township, as a courtesy, to illustrate needed firestopping; this is not a prescribed method, but one of several methods that can be used to meet requirements in the most common method of finishing a basement. *This detail may or may not be applicable to your design or method of construction.* **Code Reference:**

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
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Soffit Firstopping Detail

A 'Soffit' is a dropped down area/space that is constructed below the height of the main ceiling.

In a basement remodel situation, most often (but not always) the reason for this feature is to enclose pipes, ductwork, structural beams or other support features.

The soffit is required to be fireblocked to prevent a a fire from spreading through the soffit to all the adjoining floor bays.



One of the simplest methods of acheiving this is to install a drywall or plywood cap in the soffit. (Essentially a ceiling inside the soffit).

There are few ways to address the issue, and the method depicted may not be your preferred method, but this detail is supplied as an aide to illustrate the goal and one way of acheiving it.
